Phonics

We continued our Phase 2 phonics learning this week. We introduced the following phonemes and digraphs:







For each grapheme we learnt its corresponding phoneme (sound); 'z' as in zebra and "zz" as in "buzz", 'qu as in quick, and "ch" as in chip. This week we continued to have a go at writing CVC words as well as reading some short captions.

Home challenge: Continue to practise letter formation using the sheets sent home with your child. Use the worksheet attached to have a go at sounding out (segmenting) and blending the words then colouring the correct

Maths

Our maths learning this week we have been focussing on the number 5. We learnt a rhyme to help us with this concept called "5 little peas in a pea pod pressed". We watched the Numberblocks episode about the number 5 as part of this learning and talked about how we have "5 fingers on one hand". The children practiced making collections of objects to represent the number 5 and represented this by placing one object on each finger. In our adult led learning we look at a collection of buttons and looked at different ways to sort the buttons and counting how many of each were in each collection. This activity helped us develop key mathematical skill of counting carefuly.

Can you go on a 5 hunt? Where is this number hiding? How many ways can you see 5?
